

DRUGS EDUCATION: A POLICY STATEMENT

At Horsington Church School we aim to nurture a climate where all pupils want to learn. Through the curriculum we undertake to promote the spiritual, moral, cultural, mental and physical development of all pupils at our school. We do this through reinforcing positive behaviour and providing a caring response to the learning needs of the pupils. We recognise that medicinal drugs provide health benefits however; all drugs carry the potential for harm.

Within the context of our curriculum

- pupils are taught about the role of drugs and medicines (Key Stage 1)
- pupils are taught about the effects of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs and how these relate to their personal health (key stage 2)

AIMS

The policy aims:

- to safeguard the health and well being of all pupils;
- to outline the organisation of the school drug education programme.

SCHOOL DRUGS CO-ORDINATOR

Our school drugs co-ordinator will be the Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) & PE coordinator.

DRUG EDUCATION

It is our aim to help pupils make good choices, as they live in a society where drugs are available. All pupils have an entitlement to drug education through the provision of the science curriculum and through Personal, Social and Health Education and Citizenship at Key Stages 1 and 2.

Our drug education plans to provide opportunities for pupils to:

- consider simple social and moral dilemmas arising from different aspects of life (Key Stage 1 and 2)
- ask for help (Key Stage 1)
- find information and advice (Key Stage 2)

Our aims are:

- to emphasise the school's focus upon personal safety and personal health.

- to explore issues relevant to pupils, which are raised about drugs in society.
