Watch Alphablocks (CBeebies)

Say the alphabet – practise saying the name of the letter and the letter sound.

My name is... and I say...

Hide letters in the house/garden let the children find them and make an alphabet. Alternate lower case and capital letters.

Play I Spy

Practise segmenting words for your child to say/write eg c-a-t

Look at alphabet activities on Mini Mash

Write the alphabet – capitals and lower case. Letter writing on Mini mash

Write their name – correctly forming each letter.

Get your child to draw a picture of St George. Talk about it. Ask them to have a go at writing about their picture.

Some children may write single sounds, some may write a couple of words and some may write a sentence.

Encourage your child to have a go at some words on their own and help them out with tricky words that cannot be sounded out eg the, to, come, was.





### **Learning Projects Reception**

to be done through the week

Talk about the story behind St George's Day – George and the dragon.

Create your own Dragon – is he friendly or fearsome? Where does he live? Does he live alone? What is he called? What does he look like?

Write a poem about your Dragon – can you make it rhyme?

Draw a picture of your Dragon.

Dragons are good for investigating shape. Create a dragon made up entirely of shapes that you have drawn and cut out. How many different shapes can you use, and do you know their names? Make a Dragon's egg.

Make a Dragon cake out of sponge and decorate it.

Make a shield and a sword for George.

#### **Additional Resources**

Rhyme of the week – Baa, Baa Black Sheep. Sing/say it.

Talk about the words that rhyme. Can you think of any other words that rhyme with these? Create a picture to tell the rhyme.

Traditional tale of the week – The Three Little Pigs. Read/tell the story. Talk about what happened. Make a story map. Think about taking care of yourself and making the right decision. Representations of the houses. On a pig shaped piece of paper practise writing the letter p, draw things that begin with p and how many words can you think of that rhyme with pig.
